Just before the lockdown, the Mary Immaculate College IICS annual student fieldwork in Rome took place. Led by Dr. Patricia Kieran and Dr. Noirin Ni Riain, fourth-year MIC students, and the IICS Research Assistant spent a week in Rome last February, partaking in a memorial itinerary. The group stayed at the Irish College in Rome and were given a tour of the college and historic sites like St. John Lateran by its Rector, Rev. Dr. Ciaran O'Carroll, and Vice-Rector, Rev. Paul Finnerty. The students also spent time in Vatican City, touring the Vatican Museum and spending time in St. Peter's, roaming the city, enjoying the food and culture, climbing the Holy Stairs, embarking on a generous tour by the Franciscan Reverend Hugh McKenna of St. Isidore's Rome, went centuries underground beneath the church of St. Clemente, sang in the ancient Pantheon, led by Dr. Riain, and experienced the history of the Forum and Colosseum.

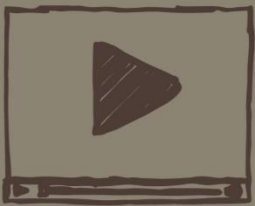
Visit with the Irish Ambassador to the Holy See

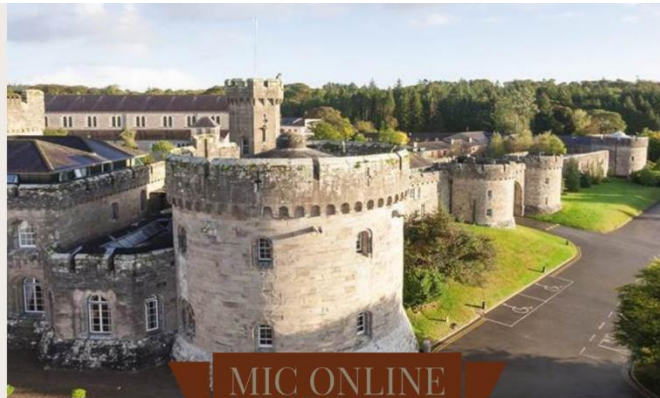

Innovative M.Ed. in Religious Education Programme

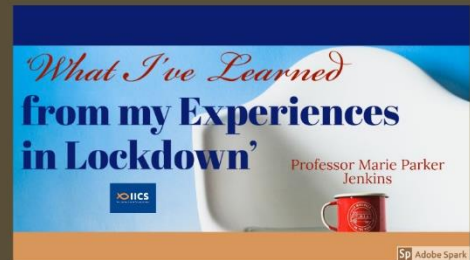

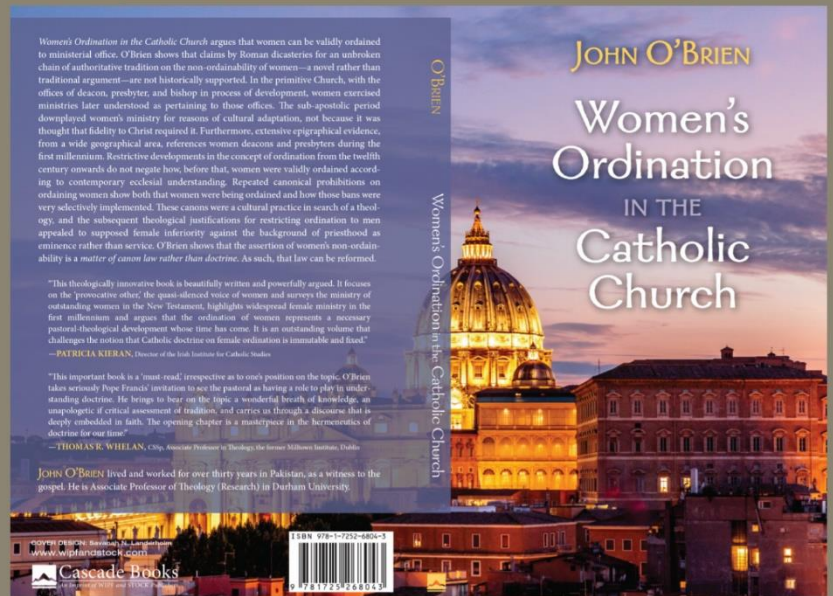


ASSOC. PROF. JOHN O'BRIEN

Women's Ordination in the Catholic Church argues that women can be validly ordained to ministerial office. O'Brien shows that claims by Roman dicasteries for an unbroken chain of authoritative tradition on the non-ordainability of women—a novel rather than traditional argument—are not historically supported. In the primitive Church, with the offices of deacon, presbyter, and bishop in process of development, women exercised ministries later understood as pertaining to those offices. The sub-apostolic period downplayed women's ministry for reasons of cultural adaptation, not because it was thought that fidelity to Christ required it. (cont. below)

Furthermore, extensive epigraphical evidence, from a wide geographical area, references women deacons and presbyters during the first millennium. Restrictive developments in the concept of ordination from the twelfth century onwards do not negate how, before that, women were validly ordained according to contemporary ecclesial understanding. Repeated canonical prohibitions on ordaining women show both that women were being ordained and how those bans were very selectively implemented. These canons were a cultural practice in search of a theology, and the subsequent theological justifications for restricting ordination to men appealed to supposed female inferiority against the background of priesthood as eminence rather than service. O'Brien shows that the assertion of women's non-ordainability is a matter of canon law rather than doctrine. As such, that law can be reformed.

Dr Liam Chambers is working on a number of projects relating to the history of Irish Catholics, especially migrants to early-modern France, including forthcoming articles on book collections in the Irish colleges in Paris, Irish Franciscans and Dominicans in early modern Paris and an unusual student case in nineteenth century Paris. He is editing volume three of the five-volume Oxford history of British and Irish Catholicism, which covers the period from the battle of Culloden (1746) to Catholic Emancipation (1829). In 2017 he edited two books with Professor Thomas O'Connor: *College Communities Abroad: Education, Migration and Catholicism in Early Modern Europe* (Manchester: Manchester University Press, 2017) and *Forming Catholic Communities: Irish, Scots and English College Networks in Europe, 1564-1918* (Leiden: Brill, 2017).

SPOTLIGHT ON THE RESEARCH OF DR. TAYO ADENUSI



CHRISTIANITY, EDUCATION AND THE COLONIAL EXPERIENCES IN WEST AFRICA: THREE PHENOMENA AND THEIR ETHICAL COMPLEXITIES

The Trojan horse theory in the critique of missionary works across pre-colonial and colonised West Africa is a dominant and recurring theme in post-colonial discourse, particularly in post-colonial discourse on education across the region (Adenusi 2019). The earliest record of Missionary work on the coasts of West Africa, which resulted in the establishment of a school, was in 1752. Thomas Thompson was a North American missionary sent to the coasts of West Africa with the single purpose of converting the natives to Christianity. After five years of continuous struggle in the Gold coast, due to the natives' rejection and resentment of his strange religion, he was able to take the son of a local influential chief, Philip Quaquo, with him on his return to England in 1757. Philip converted to Christianity, and he was ordained in England in 1765. On his return in the same year to the Cape coast, he started a school for twelve children. This is one of the earliest references to Western education in West Africa (Hilliard 1957, Adenusi 2019).

The ethical implications of early missionary works in West Africa and elsewhere have been the subject of significant critique in post-colonial discourse. While contemporary missionary organisations have become culturally sensitive and understands the need to respect and preserve local cultures and traditions, the impact of the natives' conversion to Christianity on indigenous cultural traditions and beliefs was far reaching. Post-colonial analysis of colonial experiences across West Africa often synonymise missionary works in the region with colonisation, hence, the Trojan horse theory. However, historical analysis reveals that each of these phenomena is underpinned by divergent principles. Missionary works across West Africa and elsewhere, both early and contemporary missions, are underpinned by the Christians' divine obligation to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ (Mathew 28:19). On the other hand, colonisation is underpinned by greed and the desire to subjugate the natives for the benefit, both materially and politically, of other nations and or region. Therefore, it is necessary that post-colonial analysis highlight this divergence in underpinning principles in contemporary discourse. Such distinction will further inform contemporary discourse on education in a developing region such as West Africa, at a time when the contention between global politics and local cultures has become more prominent and consequential for local tribes and indigenous groups across the region.

Prof. Michael Hayes was former president of Mary Immaculate College and founder of the Irish Institute for Catholic Studies. He was a native of Limerick and a priest of the Archdiocese of Southwark. He was a distinguished academic with a BD from the Pontifical University of Maynooth, an MA from the University of London, and a PhD in Psychosynthesis and Spiritual Direction from the University of Surrey. In May 2013 he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters (L.H.D) from De Sales University, Pennsylvania. Michael was a qualified psychotherapist as well as a distinguished researcher, author and academic leader. From 2005 until 2017 he was editor of the *The Pastoral Review*. He held Pastoral and Academic roles at Heythrop College, the School of Oriental and African Studies, and Roehampton University. Michael was Head of School of Theology, Philosophy and History, Professor of Catholic Pastoral Studies and Vice-Principal of St. Mary's University, Twickenham. In 2011, Michael was appointed President of Mary Immaculate College in Limerick and oversaw the expansion of MIC before his untimely death in 2017.

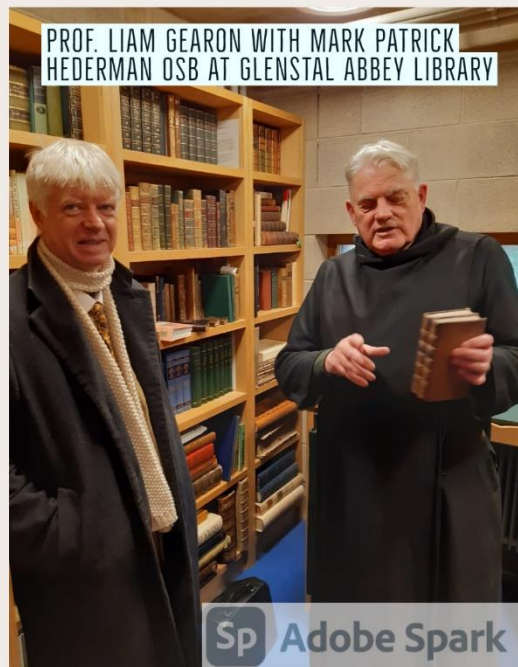
