



1916 Bursary Fund <u>Undergraduate</u> Application Form 2021-2022

The 1916 Bursary Fund, funded by the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science under PATH (Programme for Access to Higher Education) provides financial support to students identified by higher education institutions as being the most socio-economically disadvantaged from specified target groups, and it complements existing student supports and access initiatives.

The 1916 Bursary Scheme is open to all applicants who aim to pursue undergraduate higher education in 2021/22. Applicants should have made an undergraduate application for 2021/22 through the CAO to Mary Immaculate College, via one of the following admissions pathways, in order to be considered for the award of a bursary. Awardees must have been resident in the Irish State for three of the past five years on the date on which a year of study commences.

- 1. Higher Education Access Route (HEAR)
- 2. Disability Access Route to Education (DARE) priority will go to:
 - students with a physical/mobility impaired
 - students are who deaf/hard of hearing
 - students who are blind or have a visual impaired
- 3. Mature Student entry (first-time entrants only)
- 4. QQI award entry
- 5. Part-time programme entry

Applicants who have made an application may also be from one of the following target sub-groups:

- Lone parents
- Member of the Irish Traveller community
- Ethnic minorities (including programme refugee and family reunification)

The minimum eligibility criteria for you to be considered for a 1916 Bursary in the 2021/22 academic year are that you must be:

- 1. From one or more of the target groups eligible under this scheme, having entered UL through one of the specified entry pathways
- 2. In receipt of the special rate of SUSI maintenance grant and/or in receipt of a long-term means tested DEASP payment
- 3. A first-time, new entrant to higher education to undergraduate study
- 4. Resident in the State (Republic of Ireland) for three of the past five years on the date on which your first year of study commences
- 5. Pursuing an approved full-time or approved part-time undergraduate course

If you do not meet all of these minimum criteria, you cannot be considered for a 1916 Bursary for your undergraduate study. Please see below link for details of other financial assistance for which you may be eligible as a MIC student https://www.mic.ul.ie/study-at-mic/access-disability?index=6

Appendix 1: Appeals

If my application is unsuccessful, can I appeal?

Yes, however, there is only one basis for making an appeal.

1. That you believe that there was an 'administrative error in assessment' i.e. that you think that a mistake was made when your application was being reviewed that led to you not being awarded a bursary.

You have 10 days, from the receipt of your application outcome, to lodge an appeal if you are unhappy with the decision. If you fail to lodge an appeal within this timeframe, your appeal will be invalid. Appeals will be reviewed by representatives from the Mid-West Cluster. Representative(s) from your Higher Education Institution will not be involved in the appeals process. No member of staff involved in making the original decision will be involved in the appeal decision process. A letter detailing the outcome of your appeal will be emailed to you. There will be no further stage of appeal beyond this final decision.

The opening date of the appeals process will be advised in due course.
